

Boating Safety Program; The Key Message This Year OPERATOR COMPETENCY!! OPERATOR COMPETENCY!!

The Operator Competency concept was designed to fulfill four main functions for the pleasure craft operator;

- 1. to be aware of acts, regulations and codes;
- 2. to respond to emergencies;
- 3. to act responsibly in the operation of a pleasure craft;
- 4. to operate a pleasure craft.

The Boating Safety Program is delivered to the entire Central and Arctic Region which is comprised of 65% of the geography and the population of Canada, approximately 2.5 million boats.

SAFETY VIDEO DISTRIBUTION

The Office of Boating Safety has a collection of videos on various topics relating to boating safety and small vessel operations. These videos are loaned to individuals and instructional organizations free of charge. Refer to the OBS catalogue for a complete list of videos available.

These can also be helpful when doing a presentation for financial support to allow potential sponsors to see what the Auxiliary is offering to the public.

HONOUR GUARD INTRODUCED

LETTER OF RECOGNITION


Dear Irene, Andrea & Jamie,



DID YOU KNOW ???

The set fine for not having an approved P.F.D. is \$200.00 per person. In Ontario there is also a victim fine surcharge which is applied to the fine along with a \$5.00 provincial court charge.

Under the Contraventions Act you can not be jailed for failure to pay the fine. The fine will be collected through civil litigation. You can also have any associated license revoked.

FLARE DEMONSTRATIONS

Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary members are not permitted to conduct pyrotechnic distress flare demonstrations. The CCGA does not have the required insurance to cover such an event. CCGA may assist the Coast Guard personnel with flare demonstrations as crowd control, literature distribution, etc.

DISTRICT 2 LAUNCHES 3 NEW VESSELS IN 2000

Three of the community units in District 2 will plan to launch new vessels in 2000. These exciting new enterprises are the culmination of several years of hard work and effort on the part of the units and their supporters. Endless hours went into the planning, the design work, the fundraising and finally the actual building of the vessels.

The story behind each one is different but the end result was the same, a need for a better well designed vessel that the crews could have confidence in when performing taskings. GAMRU and POCOMAR will have sister boats built by the same boat yard, Dovercraft. The vessels are steel, $34\frac{1}{2}$ ft. long with a $11\frac{1}{2}$ ft. beam. There will be some minor differences between the 2 vessels to suit individual unit requirements. Both vessels will be powered by inboard diesels. GAMRU will realize the dream of owning it's own vessel after 10 years of operations using either CCG loaned RHIs of a privately owned vessel. POCOMAR will replace a smaller, single engine vessel that has outlived it's use. Hamilton Beach Rescue Unit's (HBRU) older 22 ft. Galaxy will retire in favour of a 26 ft. metal vessel.

DISTRICT 9

This has been a year of diversity for District 9. Starting with the Division of the Territories creating two new entities, the Northwest Territories and Nunuvut. Although reducing the size of the NWT it has resulted in what I believe a more cohesive and effective District and we kept the "polar bear" license plate to the chagrin of the east.

Although our taskings virtually doubled this year so too did our drownings. The settlement of Aklavik lost four people this summer in two incidents of the Beaufort. The remaining three were spread between Hay River, Yellowknife and Fort Simpson. Our thanks to the USCG from Alaska who conducted the search for three bodies between Herchel Island and the Alaskan Coast. (I know where our next District meeting will be with the new CGA/USCGA MOU). Man, do they have their....together no to mention equipment.

Just recently District 9 received \$52,000. from NWT Municipal and Community Affairs via a NIF grant to facilitate the implementation of a VHF repeater system around Great Slave Lake. This is a milestone as up until now only the Yellowknife and Hay River areas had VHF coverage. Hay River and Yellowknife Units are managing the project and will install seven repeaters providing coverage from the North Arm to Fort Reliance. Yellowknife is taking on the public awareness and educations aspect of this venture.

Over the winter Hay River Ground SAR (which is a version of the CGA, hell they are all the same people anyway) will be travelling across the lake on snowmachines to set up the first two existing CCG Racon towers. The remainder will be done using our vessels next summer. The repeaters have already been purchased from Northern Transportation Company Ltd. in Hay River who will also supply the technicians for the installation.





Our gain, in the form of the rather large and stately Ian Salisbury who opened shop in Edmonton with the Office of Boating Safety. Ian is well known in District 9 and he brings with him a vast amount of knowledge. Certainly is nice not to hear the standard phrase: "Hi, I'm from Sarnia, I'm here to help". Just kidding Ian, eh well, Peter has a sense of humour or does he?

District Training was a resounding success this past year with Two

Boat Operators/SAR I courses in Hay River, SAR I courses in Inuvik, Yellowknife and next month in Fort Chipewyan. Yellowknife participated in a joint CGA/Fire Department excercise in Yellowknife Bay involving a House boat fire and the transporting and operating of fire equipment. As well keep your eyes tuned to "North of 60" as the Yellowknife Unit participated and I understand "starred" so to speak in one of the upcoming episodes. Well at least the boats you'll see are authentic!!:

A very successful joint CGA/Yellowknife Ground SAR/CASARA excercise was held in the North Arm of Great Slave Lake. True to form they got "blasted" by the weather leaving people stranded on shore and having to overnight. This was about as realistic as one could get.

Yellowknife has acquired a surplus Zodiac 733 hurricane from CCG in Ontario. It should be delivered in early spring. This provides a much needed asset for their Unit to cover the north side of the Lake.

Inuvik in it's first full year got well Baptized. Two lengthy searches on the Mackenzie Delta and Beaufort Sea quickly identified a number of problems in communication and supply. These guys were living in tents and sleeping in boats during the three day searches. No marinas for a warm shower, food and more importantly fuel. We now have improved communications in the form of a portable MSAT and avionics radio onboard. We also got our first "jet boat" registered in Inuvik. The other one I have here in Hay River.

The world championship Jet Boat Races were held in Hay River this spring and our Unit participated (not in the races) by providing recovery support. My God could we have fun with the new A2 rates on these babies!:

Our newest Unit Fort Chipewyan, Alberta is up and running and to say the least consists of a very impressive group of people. We went down via our Police Plane (no charge for District travel Marion) and participated in a training session for two days. The new RCMP boat got baptized and we left with a feeling of confidence in this group. They clearly have their....together.

I would like to thank C/Supt. Bill Sweeney, Commanding Officer RCMP, "G" Division for his support of the CGA and the partnership concept that is working. He believes in this and has spread the word to other C.O.'s in Western Canada. He has provided not only the use of the RCMP vessels in our MOU's but as well the use of "CFMPA", our Police plane to transport instructors and other CGA personal to the various Units for training and exercises. (No bitching about mileage rates up here!) Thanks Bill. As well I want to express my appreciation for the outstanding cooperation we continue to receive from Hay River CCG. This is how it is supposed to work and does up here.

Where are we going in the next millennium? Straight ahead with our training, projects and yes, INLAND EXPANSION.


BACKGROUND ON PUKTA

The word Pukta (pronounced pook-to) means "Floating" and comes from the Inuktitut verb puktaaq which means 'to float'.

The idea for Pukta was initially developed in 1996 under the Small Boat Safety Awareness Program by Sue MacDonald the PDO. The idea for a polar bear as the mascot was developed and a contest ran on the internet to name the mascot. The contest was open to all persons in the North West Territories. As a reward for winning the contest Sarah Ittinuar of Rankin Inlet received PFD's and floater suits for her family.

In total there are four full size mascots in the Coast Guard Central and Arctic Region. These mascots are available for use at safe boating events, presentations, parades and children's events.

Districts 2 & 3 work together at Backus Conservation Area to promote boating safety.

CHANNEL 16 IS YOUR LINK TO SAFETY

This is a message that is not reaching some of our boating public. It never fails to amaze me the number of times we are asked 'How do I get help when I'm out on the water?'.

Many boaters now carry cell phones but few carry a charger. They know there is a 1-800-# but wrote it down at home. When an emergency happens do they have time to call home to get someone to call for help. Not likely, *16 the boaters 911 needs to be promoted.

The use of a marine radio is still the 'Safety Link' of choice. Cell phones are definitely better than nothing but can't be heard by others in the area. The monitoring of channel 16 by CCG & CCGA can reduce response time immensely.

STRANGE BUT TRUE NEWS

The Edmonton Journal, 1,10,1999

PORT ALBERNI, B.C. - Jeffery Bockman had a boat full of Bibles but Coast Guard officials say he didn't have a prayer.

Bockman was rescued three times off the west coast of Vancouver Island this summer in his leaky homemade boat. He planned to cross the Pacific to deliver Bibles to Russia.

Instead, he ended up in court charged with failing to observe a detention order under the Canada Shipping Act and with failing to display a conformity plate on his homemade boat.

Bockman was rescued for the first time on June 21, then again a week later. Five days after that, on July 3, he was at sea again. Or, more precisely, almost in the sea.

Bockman's boat, the Winged Queen, had no flares and no lights. It was taking on 180 litres of water an hour when the Coast Guard came to his rescue.

"I was planning on sailing to Russia and bailing all the way," he told Judge Brian Klaver on Wednesday. "I'm from Alberta. I know nothing about the sea." The man told the officer that he planned to carry a shipload of English Bibles to Russia.

On July 9 the boat was placed under a detention order not to be moved from the harbour. Four days later it was gone. The Coast Guard started searching and found Bockman had run aground on a small island. Bockman said he moved so he could dry dock the boat and begin repairs.

He's acquired some flares and lights and still plans to fix the Winged Queen and sail to Russia with bibles.


"Why not bundle them up in boxes and have them shipped?" asked the judge. Bockman admitted he may have to do just that.
