CENTRAL & ARCTIC OFFICE of BOATING SAFETY

The Office of Boating Safety was formed in 1995 to deliver an integrated and comprehensive program to reduce safety risks and environmental impacts associated with associated with recreational boating and commercial fishing across all inland and coastal waters in Canada. The OBS program encompasses activities directed at working in partnership and ensuring safe boaters, safe boats and a safe boating environment.

The Boating Safety Specialist (BSS) program is a Coast Guard Central & Arctic regional program made up of Coast Guard personnel and volunteer partners such as members of the Auxiliary. Together we provide a valuable service to the general public, staffing boat shows, doing presentations, attending safety events and conducting Pleasure Craft Courtesy Checks. As an incentive Coast Guard offers an Incentive Program. This newly developed program offers points awarded to each BBSer based on their work and volunteer hours. The points can be accumulated to earn prizes ranging from pens and pins to rigging knives, briefcases and Personal Floatation Devices. This program is not offered to Coast Guard employees, only volunteers.

BECOMING A BOATING SAFETY SPECIALIST

In order to become a qualified BSSer you must complete a series of training sessions based on the level of participation you want to achieve.

OBS 1 - Pleasure Craft Courtesy Check

Training to carry out examinations on rec reational vessels ensuring that they meet the standards set by the Small Vessel Regulations.

OBS 2 - Presentation Skills

OBS 1 is a pre-requisite.

You may now plan, prepare and carry out presentations.

OBS 3 - Exhibitor Skills

OBS 1 & 2 are pre-requisites.

You may now set up and work at booth boat shows.....

These are excellent courses for those of us who would like to help keep the boating and general public informed. This is a great opportunity for individuals who are more comfortable on land than water.

CCG CREST NOW PROTECTED

The Canadian Coast Guard crest is now an official trade-mark. The Integrated Business Management Directorate decided to register the crest under the Trade-mark Act.

The action was undertaken to protect the integrity of the CCG crest. It is an important symbol of the authority that CCG has developed because of hard work and dedicated service of generations of employees. Unfortunately, unauthorized use of the CCG crest by private organizations has led members of the public to believe that CCG had approved some products when it had not. In another incident, an organization used a logo that looked similar enough to the CCG crest to cause confusion.

Now that the crest is registered, no one will be allowed to adopt it or create anything closely resembling it without permission Any individual wishing to use the crest will have to set up a licensing agreement or similar arrangement with CCG.

The next step is to develop a policy on the ways the crest can be used. This policy will guide the decisions relating to future requests for the use of the crest. Along with the policy, licensing agreements will probably be negotiated for certain specific situations.

WHAT DOES THE CREST REPRESENT?

The CCG crest has been in use since 1962 when it was approved by the Queen. Oval in shape, the crest is divided vertically into a blue section symbolizing water, and a white section symbolizing ice.

On the white half there is a red maple leaf, the emblem of Canada. The two golden dolphins, one facing inward the other outward, are displayed on the blue half. They are symbols of the CCG ships that operate on the coasts of Canada. The dolphin, long known as a friend to mariners, is considered to be an appropriate symbol for our organization, whose primary concern is ensuring safety in Canadian waters.

Because ropes are an important part of life at sea, the crest is enclosed within a rope frame tied at the base. To indicate that CCG ships are in the service of the Queen in right of Canada, the crest is surmounted by the Royal Crown.

Fantastic Promotion of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary by District 4

I wish there was the space to print out the entire article from the June 2000 Marketplace newspaper. It's excellent to see a group promoting the Auxiliary in such a positive way.

When three friends ventured out for a day of fishing and camaraderie on the 'big' lake, they had no idea what was in store for them. Their beautiful sunshine and high spirits began to fade after they hit something under the surface causing the vessel to refuse to go into gear. As they began to drift, the sun began to set and the fog began to settle.

Three anxious wives made a collective decision to call the Marine and Air Search and Rescue number from the phone book. Their husbands were overdue and a heavy fog had now settled. The CCG in turn contacted the closest Auxiliary Unit.

The CCGA determined, from the information they received and with the computer expertise regarding wind and water speed, the approximate location that the boat may have drifted toward.

Within twenty minutes, a boat manned with search and rescue volunteers began it's mission... to find three men, hopefullystill afloat.

The article goes on to describe the CCG and CCGA beginnings. Kincardine Training Officer, Keith

Filby did an excellent job at explaining the requirements of Auxiliary membership and the commitment of time donated by the Bluewater Rescue Unit. Equally important was the recogni-

tion that he gave to community groups. Their boat the Mysis was donated by Ontario Hydro. Campbell's Fuels donates the fuel, Bruce Municipal Telephone System donated pagers to reach members. The Legion provides the meeting space and the Lions Club donated radar and other equipment.

Captain and District Commander Herb Paetzold also pointed out the excellent support of their community. Klaus Goebels of the Port Elgin unit explained the area covered by the local Auxiliary. While District Director Don Limoges discussed response times, training and financial commitment and support.

If you don't have proof of operator competency or a dockside checklist —The fine under the Contraventions Act is \$250.00. Police officers also have the option of prosecuting an infraction as a summary convection offense which may result in a greater fine assessed by a court.

DISTRICT 9-NWT & ALBERTA

Again our season is short but we are busy. This has been a most exciting year for our District one which saw double the number of SAR Taskings and a number of new and creative ventures.

With the expansion of the Diamond Mines, Oil and Gas within NWT disposable income is quadrupled. Subsequently toys (boats) have increased proportionally. Again Yellowknife took the lions share of Rescues while Hay River picked up the long range searches (2 days or more). We had a few unique ones that defied logic namely, two vessels both lost and overdue from separate locations. After two days both were found together approximately 100 NM from their original location and in the opposite direction. One Skipper having not completely mastered his GPS systematically deleted his waypoints while coming out of Yellowknife Bay. The other missed the fairway bouy at Devils Channel. Both traveled completely across the lake meeting by accident then arguing about who was lost and who was assisting. We assisted and dragged the pair back to Hay River.

Inuvik got the dirty jobs this year, that of body recovery. Two incidents where in three persons drowned. The first one involved a group of intoxicated youth who drove a pick up off the boat launch ramp and still clutching their beer cans, two drowned. The other was a tragedy where a Father attempted to rescue his daughter and drowned.

Fort Chipewyan experienced their first two Searches this summer and did an excellent job on Lake Athabasca.

We launched our Great Slave Lake VHF repeater where in the CGA is placing repeaters on existing CCG Nav Aids around Great Slave Lake to provide VHF coverage. This in conjunction with Inuvik MCTS worked like a "damn". This coming season we will complete the seven sites which will provide boat-

Yellowknife got their new (previously driven) RHI 733 this year from Port Dover and it worked excellent after we replaced an engine. Thanks here to the SLADICS/CROFTON mob for making this happen.

Our members attended the Calgary, Edmonton and Yellowknife Boat Shows this past year and after a grueling session put on by the colossal Ian SALIBBURY we managed to get through. At one point the Members were being recruited by the people in the booth for Democratic Firearm Reform, they wanted to trade bumper stickers for PCOC cards. Seemed like a hell of a deal since we at least knew who was printing the bumper stickers......

Over the navigation season we ran two one week Boat Operators/SAR 1 courses in Hay River and Marc GAGNON and the other two previously mentioned reprobates put on a RHIOT course. Next year their navigation portion will end up in Yellowknife where SLADICS has found what he terms a "golf course".

In keeping with the Arctic Strategy District 9 has opened another in Aklavik. Both Units will utilize the RCMP vessels under the CGA/RCMP Memorandum of Understanding and will be up and running when the Ice goes (in July).

Special thanks this year to Marc GAGNON, Greg SLADICS and Terry CROFTON. You guys have it together and know what we're about. As well our continued outstanding relationship with the CCG Hay River Base and Inuvik MCTS makes life up here relatively simple. Stephen SHERBURNE our new OBS guy in Yellowknife made the trip to Inuvik over the Dempster Highway this summer in what would be termed as a CCG Van now that they have their own insurance. He is doing an excellent job and is supported 100% by our Units.

The invitation is again extended to anyone that is up this way to sample some of our Northern Hospitality.
