



Brave Kayak Rescue in Port au Persil Earns Fernand Boily the CCGA Operational Merit Award



Fernand Boily went to the rescue of two kayakers who were suffering from hypothermia.

n June 12, 2005, Mr. Fernand Boily arrived at Port au Persil to go kayaking with his daughter. The police informed him that some people were having difficulty in the water more than a kilometre away.

After ensuring that an ambulance was on its way, Mr. Boily informed the Coast Guard that he was going to paddle out in his kayak in the direction of the accident taking with him a blanket, a VHF radio and a few other marine safety articles.

When he arrived at the scene, he saw two men stranded on the rocks. One was trembling, stuck in a crack in the rocks and the other was incapable of using his kayak to help his friend.

He told the shivering man to take off his clothes and gave him his own. "I told the man to get undressed and wear my clothes," Mr. Boily said. "They helped to warm his body. After that, I laid him down in my kayak, head between my legs and I took him back where the ambulance was."

Mr. Boily is a member of Unit 26 – Cap-à-l'Aigle, and was awarded the Operational Merit Award at the March 18th CCGA Quebec AGM.

A Governance Review of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary

The Institute on Governance, a non-profit organization based in Ottawa, has been tasked to undertake a comparative study on governance best practices in voluntary sector governance and in government voluntary-sector partnerships, with a focus on the unique relationship between the Canadian Coast Guard and the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary (CCGA).

This initiative considers governance, policy and other organizational issues facing the CCGA, with particular focus on working toward clearly defined roles, responsibilities and processes for the whole of the CCGA, while ensuring that regional differences are recognized and respected.

The study is taking place in four phases:

Phase I - Diagnosis and Validation

a) Document Review

b) Interviews: CCG/CCGA

c) Interviews: Parallel Organizations

- d) Draft Summary Report of Results of Diagnostic Phase
- e) Canadian Coast Guard Review Meeting
- f) CCGA Review Meeting

Phase IV - Drafting and Publication of Research Paper

Drawing on its assessment of CCG and CCGA, the IOG will draft a publication, intended for public consumption, provisionally entitled *Partnering to Serve Canadians*. In addition, IOG will support Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary and Fisheries and Oceans Canada communications on the project in order to showcase the leadership role that the Auxiliary and the Department would be taking by helping to identify exemplary practices in government-voluntary sector service delivery partnerships.



CCGA C&A AGM Salutes Contribution of Dedicated Auxiliarists

he 27th Annual General Meeting of the CCGA C&A was held on January 14, 2006 in Mississauga, Ontario. A meet and greet took place the evening before, giving members an opportunity to acquaint themselves with faces both old and new.

CCGA National Awards were given in 3 categories: Administrative Excellence (1 recipient), Operational Merit (2 recipients) and Long Service Medals (6 recipients)

The CCGA National CEO, Robert Petitpas, joined CCGA C&A President Jack Kruger in making the presentations.

Mr. Nick Doralp was presented with the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary Medal of Administrative Excellence. A member of the Auxiliary since 1998, he has since moved on to become the unit leader of the South Central Arctic Boating Safety Unit, which is responsible for Safe Boating activities within District 2. He is also coxswain with TOWARF.

In the beginning of 2005, he designed and developed a new website for the CCGA C&A to better suit the growing needs of the region. The new site has changed how the Central and Arctic conducts daily business and allows for more current and up to date records.

Mr. Grant Moffat was presented with the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary Medal of Operational Merit. A member of the Auxiliary since 1982, he saved a man from serious injury or death on September 4, 2005, while on his vessel the "Summers Dream" in the area of the Benjamin Islands on the North Channel of Georgian Bay.

Mr. Jim Gram was presented with the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary Operational Merit Medal for exceptionally meritorious services to the CCGA C&A. Mr. Gram joined the Auxiliary in 1991, quickly becoming an active member of the POCOMAR unit, as well as an active participant in District and Regional training activities.

Mr. Gram has established himself as an annual participant as a judge in the regional SAR Challenge since 2001, an active participant in the development and review of training manuals, a developer of material for use in SAR Instructor training and has had significant involvement in the PCCC program.
