





CCGA Pacific currently has 1,158 members and 67 enrolled vessels. In 2006, Auxiliarists were tasked 852 times.







CCGA Central & Arctic currently has 775 members and 99 enrolled vessels. In 2006, Auxiliarists were tasked 188 times to SAR incidents.






Auxiliarists participated in 19 training exercises and 209 boat shows, exhibitions and displays. They also conducted 779 courtesy checks on pleasure crafts.

CCGA Quebec currently has 665 members and 152 enrolled vessels. In 2006, Auxiliarists were tasked 367 times to SAR incidents.






Auxiliarist also participated in 70 training exercises and 45 boat shows, exhibitions and displays. They conducted 652 courtesy checks on pleasure crafts.






CCGA Maritimes currently has 741 members and 438 enrolled vessels. In 2006, Auxiliarists were tasked 218 times to SAR incidents.










CCGA Member Assists with Rescue in Alaska

The CCGA-P office received this e-mail from Michael Robinson, Commodore for the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary District 17 (Alaska).

CCGA-P Unit 1 Unit Leader Mike Cupit, who was attending the USCGAux.'s coxswain academy in Homer, Alaska, took part in a rescue of 13 people. Details are below:

The Coast Guard Auxiliary in Homer Alaska, Wednesday April 25, 2007 rescued 13 people from a sinking charter vessel. The D17 Coxswain academy was on the water with two auxiliary non-standard boats doing towing drills when the call was heard about a vessel taking on water.

Auxiliary vessel 275594 a 27' Safeboat responded, being the fastest platform with two 250hp outboards. The twenty mile transit was made at 40 knots and 275594 arrived on scene to a 40 foot charter vessel with 13 people aboard making way at about 6 knots with the rear deck awash and all passengers on the forward deck trying to balance the boats movement.

The Auxiliary vessel came alongside the stricken vessel and eleven people, all the passengers, were pulled aboard to the forward deck of 275594. At this time the stricken vessel started to roll over on its side within 30 seconds after the last passenger was removed. Auxiliary 594 moved away to clear the sinking vessel and the two remaining people, the master and his crewmember climbed the hull as it rolled. 275594 then approached again and nosing up to the overturned vessel pulled the two remaining survivors aboard.

Within a minute of the last survivor boarding Auxiliary 275594 the stricken vessel sank. The sunken vessels life raft deployed and broke the surface approximately one minute later. At this time the USCG Cutter Roanoke Island arrived on scene and its small boat was deployed and all the survivors were transferred from Auxiliary 275594 to the Roanoke Island.

All hands from the sunken vessel were transported safely back to Homer Alaska, shaken but unharmed by the experience. No members of the sunken vessel entered the water. The members of 275594 were Shane Taylor - coxswain, from Anchorage; Ray Miller - crew from Fairbanks; Richard Liebe - crew, from Anchorage; and Michael Cupit - crew, from Vancouver BC a Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliarist attending the District 17 Coxswain Academy as an exchange student.



Mr. McGeoghegan,

I would like to thank you and the crew of the CGA Vessel Boards N Glue for the exemplary service you provided to the sinking vessel, Grey Shadow, on the evening of 02 May 2007.

At 10:27 pm, the Grey Shadow was reported broken down and taking on water off Pinette, PEI with two people on board. The vessel did not have a life raft or lifeboat, and the only communication was through cellular telephone. When called by the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre in Halifax, you gathered a crew and were able to get away from the dock within minutes, despite the late hour. When arriving on scene, you were able to expeditiously pump out the Grey Shadow and tow the vessel to a safe port. Without your quick response and professional actions, this case may have resulted in the loss of a vessel, or worse the loss of life.

The actions of your crew exemplify the very best of the professionalism and dedication of the Canadian Coast Guard Auxiliary. Please accept my sincere thanks for the stellar response of the Boards N Glue to this incident. Were she a naval vessel, I would hoist the signal "BZ".

Answering the Call for Humanitarian Assistance; CCG will help give the Gift of Life

C anadian Coast Guard and its Auxiliary, have long been saving lives on the water. Now, thanks to an agreement with the Trillium Gift of Life Network, Central and Arctic Region personnel and Auxiliarists may play a role in saving lives on land, too.

Gift of Life is a not-for-profit government organization which oversees all organ and tissue donation activities for the Province of Ontario. Organ and tissue donation is a vital issue that affects all Canadians and is responsible for saving and giving quality of life to thousands of people each year. When it comes to organ donation and the patients waiting to receive them, every minute counts. Before an organ can be transplanted, time sensitive blood tests for HIV, Hepatitis, and West Nile virus need to done.

In most cases blood samples from Hamilton area donors have to be analyzed in Toronto. Transportation is usu-

ally done via Ontario Provincial Police vehicles, and in peak traffic times, precious minutes and sometimes hours are lost. Helicopters have very limited availability. With these hurdles to overcome, transportation to Toronto via Lake Ontario is a viable option.

Last summer, the Gift of Life Network had six opportunities to use the services of marine units belong to Toronto, Peel and Hamilton Regional Police Services. Each time the blood was received at the Toronto lab in under an hour, saving 2-3 hours off the total donation process in each case.

"One high profile case required the use of the marine unit to transport the surgical recovery team and their organ to a waiting recipient that was critically ill. If we had not had the opportunity to travel by water the outcome for the recipient may not have been so wonderful," explains Gift of Life Hamilton Coordinator Nancy Hemrica.

This year, CCG Central and Arctic Region and its Auxiliary, will participate in this humanitarian endeavor. If the need arises and Marine Search and Rescue (SAR) resources are available, they will be tasked by the Joint Rescue Coordi-

nation Centre (JRCC) in Trenton. In the Hamilton area, the closest SAR units are Hamilton Beach Rescue 905 and 906 crewed by CCG Auxilarists. CCGA units GAMRU in Grimsby and TOWARF in Oakville are also nearby. The Canadian Coast Guard Cutter Cape Storm in Port Weller could also be tasked if required.

"This is a wonderful precedent and I hope we can use this opportunity to help others," noted CCG's Danny Coultis, Supervisor of Marine Search and Rescue.

"When people think outside the box such as this, it can translate into something that improves and saves lives," said CCGA regional Director of Operations Richard "Butch" Dompierre. "Thanks go to the people that had the foresight to try it in the first place. We as a Volunteer Search and Rescue organization are very pleased that we have been given the opportunity to participate."
